Our **Parish elections** will be held on **Sunday, January 27, 2019** – the day of our Parish Annual Meeting. Qualified voters will cast ballots that morning, although absentee ballots can be obtained from the Parish Office for voting before that date. The candidates will speak at a **Candidates' Forum** on **Sunday, January 13, 2019**.

In the statements that follow, each candidate was asked to address three questions:

- 1) How long have you been part of St. Alban's and what activities or ministries feed you spiritually?
- 2) What professional experience and personal strengths would help you serve the Parish as a lay leader?
- 3) As a lay leader in the church, it is common to work with people of diverse views. How would you seek to move St. Alban's forward as one body of Christ?

2019 Offices and Balloting Procedure

We're electing a new **Senior Warden** to serve a three-year term. The Senior Warden is the principal lay officer of the Parish; provides counsel to the Rector, the Vestry, and the Parish as to all programs of the Parish; and executes legal documents when directed by the Vestry. Candidates for Senior Warden must have served at least two years of service on the St. Alban's Vestry.

We're electing a **Junior Warden** to serve the final year of a term that was vacated in 2018. The Junior Warden serves as the associate (after the Senior Warden) lay officer of the Parish, and is specifically responsible for providing counsel to the Rector, the Vestry, and the Parish, in accordance with normally accepted business practices, as to the property of the Parish.

And we're electing four new **Vestry Members** to serve 3-year terms. The Vestry is responsible for the management of Parish property and its financial resources, provides advice to the Rector and other clergy on Parish matters, and has power to act on behalf of the Parish as a corporate body as specified in the Canons of the Diocese and of the General Convention.

There are two important things to note, about this year's election.

<u>First</u>, you'll see that three of the four Warden candidates are also standing, simultaneously, for election to the Vestry. We've instituted this practice – of offering Warden candidates the opportunity to also stand for election to the Vestry – in order to avoid losing altogether the possibility that a Warden candidate who is not elected to <u>that</u> office may have no other chance to serve in elected lay leadership. It will work this way: Warden votes will be counted first, and a winning Warden candidate will be dropped off the Vestry Member candidate list, with any votes he/she receives for Vestry Member disregarded. The remaining Vestry Member candidates will be ranked by votes received, and elected accordingly.

<u>Second</u>, we are continuing the practice of <u>requiring that if you cast votes for Vestry Members</u>, <u>you *must* vote for *FOUR* candidates, to fill all the vacancies. This is important, in order to ensure that votes for fewer than four candidates don't unfairly weight the ballot count. A ballot that contains votes for fewer than four Vestry Member candidates will be discounted altogether as to Vestry Member votes (although <u>not</u> as to Warden votes).</u>

You probably see me most often in a role I've truly come to love as Verger a/k/a liturgical stage manager.

What you may not have seen is my deepening involvement with the diocese. I've served as our Diocesan Delegate and Regional Convener for the D.C. North Region and am presently representing St. Alban's and the other parishes in DC North on the Diocesan Council. The Council is the diocesan equivalent of the vestry with responsibility for approving the budget and assisting bishop Mariann in working with the 80-plus parishes. It's been a real privilege to see her at work; she is amazing. I'm on the subcommittee that reviews Congregational Growth grant applications from parishes. My name is Lucy Fraser Cage, and I'm standing for the position of Junior Warden. I currently hold this position, having stepped in after a mid-year vacancy.

Having attended St. Alban's since 2000, I'm committed to serving the parish in a number of ways, and I have found the role of Junior Warden to be an ideal fit. My background is in commercial real estate, and I've handled asset and property management for numerous portfolios of properties. I have extensive experience with facilities management, budgeting, capital projects and operational issues that arise on a daily basis. With an MBA in Finance and Real Estate, I'm also able to step back and look at the big picture, as well as delve into the details when appropriate. These combined skills helped me work effectively this past year with Charles Porter and others, helping to ensure certain projects came to fruition, including the flagstone terrace and walkway replacement.

I find other ways to be involved, as well, at St. Alban's. I currently lead the Garden Guild, which has renewed a number of landscaped areas around the property, I'm an active member of the Flower Guild, and I have helped in the past with Sunday School, specifically the 2s and 3s. I also served as a Vestry member prior to transitioning to the Junior Warden role.

I believe that St. Alban's is stronger than ever and has developed a more stable foundation over this past year. We still have work to do, and it's ongoing. We are a living and breathing body of diverse individuals who must come together to build upon what we have achieved. As a consensus builder, I look for ways to bridge differences and bring people together for the common good. My wife and I started our St. Alban's journey 36 years ago, when Rev. Ted Eastman married us. Our sons were baptized and confirmed here. The former Usher Captain George Hooper recruited me and serving as an usher opened a path which led to lay reading, two terms on Vestry, co-chairing our first million-dollar Stewardship campaign, and chairing the Transformation Fund. I am spiritually strengthened here by, first of all, regular worship, prayer, sermons and Communion. Our St. Alban's family is a constant source of wisdom, faith, compassion and guidance. A deeper understanding of my faith came from the four-year EFM program, which I completed in 2018, and yearly Advent retreat studies.

I retired from a 50-year career in broadcast journalism in 2013. The ability to think, work and improvise when necessary, on deadline, is key to a journalist's career, and I think those skills would be useful to a Junior Warden. I also bring "Harry homeowner" skills, for which I thank my Navy Chief Dad.

George Hooper told me the first thing a person coming to St. Alban's sees is the face of an Usher, so make sure it is a welcoming, understanding face, the face of God. That has stuck with me. I recall being confronted while standing for Vestry by an angry parishioner. "What are you going to do about all the gays?" He demanded. I said I would welcome them, following the example of Christ and the policy of our Diocese. But I urged him to sit and talk with me about it further, which we did. I know he went away less angry afterwards, still firm in his opposition, but grateful to have been heard. Another parishioner complained to me that he didn't feel welcome. "Nobody talks to me", he said. I apologized for that and made a point of greeting him and spending a few minutes with him whenever I could. Today that person is on the Vestry.

In early 2017, while planning a wedding and navigating the foster care licensing process, Justine and I found St. Alban's. We were overcome by the warm welcome. And by all the children.

I'm a cradle Episcopalian. From an early age, I was moved by the liturgy—it both grounded and stirred me, comforted and provoked me. But as a kid, I always craved something deeper than our home parishes provided. After college I found it in the Young Adult Service Corps. For one year I lived in Kisumu, Kenya and worked for an NGO loosely affiliated with the Diocese of Maseno West. The experience was formative. It shaped how I interpret my call as a Christian, what it looks like to truly love neighbors as ourselves, and how to live in communion.

Justine and I—now married and licensed foster parents—have become regulars in Children's Chapel, along with Jade and Jeremiah, who joined us in October. As foster parents, we provide a nurturing, safe home for D.C. children who aren't safe at their homes due to abuse or neglect. For us, it's an extension of our faith—a way we can love neighbors in our own community. We are thankful to have found and been welcomed into this community. In November, Justine was received into the Episcopal Church, while I reaffirmed my baptismal vow. Once Jade and Jeremiah get settled, I look forward to contributing more to the community that has embraced us, including helping with Sunday School.

An attorney by training, I work as a Legislative Analyst at the Congressional Research Service, where I analyze and write authoritative, nonpartisan summaries of federal legislation. Before that, I worked for a U.S. Senator.

We live nearby, in a 27-unit coop full of eclectic personalities. As an all-too-regular fixture on the coop board, I mediate disputes over the source of (and responsibility for) leaks; I negotiate and draft controversial changes to the house rules (e.g., to permit dogs); I prepare, present, and justify the annual budget; and I ensure that board actions comply with governing documents and past practices and promote the future economic health of our building and community.

If called to serve on the Vestry, I'll ask questions to understand the complexities of issues at hand; I'll try to identify and broaden areas of agreement; and I'll support efforts to strengthen our engagement in the community and world.

I have been a member of St. Alban's for over 25 years. I currently serve as Chair of Grate Patrol, a member of the God's Work in the World Committee, a Lay-reader (for over a decade), and as a classroom volunteer at Tubman Elementary School. I served as Co-Chair of "Opportunity Sunday" (for 3 years), Chair and Co-Chair of the Global Mission Committee, and Chair of St. Alban's Thanksgiving Day Dinner (four years). For several years I served as Chair of the St. Alban's Day Picnic and as a member of the Overseas Mission Committee, helping to lead multi-generational mission trips to Honduras. In the wider Episcopal community, I was a founder of Washington Episcopalians Respond to Katrina (WERK), serving as Co-Chair of that three-year effort by ten churches, including multiple work trips to the Gulf Coast. I serve on the Diocesan Southern Africa Partnership Committee, as a Lay-reader at the Washington National Cathedral, and as a Diocesan Delegate for St. Alban's.

St. Alban's is and has been a source of personal strength to me. In turn, I offer in service the experience of my long and enthusiastic engagement with St. Alban's. I also offer skills honed in leadership positions during a career focused on federal/state health policy and financing. I received my AB from Vassar College and Ph.D. from the University of Virginia. I have served as an academic, in the federal government, as a consultant to state governments, and as a partner in a major health policy research and consulting firm. I have authored three books and numerous monographs and technical articles on topics ranging from public/private options for financing long-term care to health information technology in aging services.

Diverse views and backgrounds are a source of our community's strength. Central Christian teachings ("There is one body...") and our national motto (E Pluribus Unum) remind of this. But our beloved community was nearly riven by divisions not long ago. Walking through that fire with you taught me the power of practices advised by our new Rector: giving up a need to be right (a hard one for me, alas), emulating those good examples among us who actively listen to others, suspending the urge to judge. We pulled each other through, radically persisting, now happily learning from new-comers.
