

## LEO COCO -- CANDIDATE FOR DIOCESAN DELEGATE

 How long have you been a part of St. Alban's and what activity or ministry feeds you spiritually?

Over 25 years ago our family joined St. Alban's. The church and parish community are central to our spiritual lives and define to a great extent who we are and how we have made our home in Washington. I have been active through the years in service to many ministries and committees and have supported initiatives to move the

parish's mission into action.

Serving as a lay reader is without question the most significant ministry in my spiritual development and provides a sustained opportunity to contribute to the services at St. Alban's. I have been a lay reader for almost 20 years and have coordinated the training and scheduling of lay readers for four of those years.

A more recent ministry has been the creation of an annual retreat for the past three years to bring parishioners together in an atmosphere of spiritual exploration and the creation of art centered on religious themes.

 What professional experience and personal strengths would help you serve the Parish as a lay leader?

Most of my professional life has been spent in leadership positions in the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Department of Education where skills were well honed in negotiating policies that brought consensus in an open and trustful way and navigating political agendas to lead to successful outcomes reflecting a blending of different views and philosophies. Currently, I am a senior policy advisor in the Washington office of a large southeastern based law firm. I opened that office in 2004 after retiring from the federal government and now am the most senior of 60 professionals in the office. Challenging as that has been, I look on this period as one of continued personal growth and a balancing act of helping to expand an office and succeed in my own issue driven work which continues to focus on education and particularly policies that promote access for all students to music and arts education.

As a lay leader in the church, it is common to work with people of diverse views.
How would you seek to move St. Alban's forward as one body of Christ?

What I have relied on most is being a thoughtful and accessible listener and someone who brings people together when they seem to be drifting apart. It remains a goal. Now that my wife and I are moving to retirement, I search for ways to contribute to those things in my life I hold most closely. St. Alban's is at the top of the list. I am grateful to be blessed with this church and congregation.

 How long have you been a part of St. Alban's and what activity or ministry feeds you spiritually?
